Daily Republic Publisher Bill James recently reviewed the goings on at the last Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District Governing Board meeting when the issue of a fourth high school stoked passionate sentiments. I was there, and I was ashamed.

Passionately divisive issues can lead to fanning the fires of faulty reasoning and paranoia, self-absorption, arrogance and at times sheer hubris and lack of common graces. See for yourself, Thursdays at 10:30, Channel 26.

Vice Mayor Jack Batson choreographed a presentation based on the erroneous belief (for now) that a deal was in the works for a new high school in the valley. Bullying from the pulpit and reigning down from the dais, indignant board president Gary Falati served up a Filatian filet



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of Batson burger in a pedantic Perry Mason-like manner reminiscent of post-adolescent school boy debates. Pressured speech, escalating tones, officiousness, intemperate threats and surprise "gotcha's" were the side dishes.

At the end of his soliloquy, Falati aptly observed, "Suisun Valley is hurting, the beautiful statue ... is not (its) ... salvation ..." The vice mayor's presently incorrect accusation and board president Falati's response are precisely what Dr. Franklin warned leaders against.
